
ment is building as we head toward Commitment Sunday, April 15!




DONALD G. BEETEM

THE DRAWINGS-

The subjects of these sketches were not selected for their formal beauty nor historical significance. A group of scenes was desired that should be picturesque, unhackneyed, and so representative of Carlisle that the native would instantly recognize the scenes of his home and at the same time see them enhanced by art in a fresh light, as though not seen before. We think the artist has accomplished this purpose. Hundreds of subjects were eligible, and choice was made almost at random of a dozen scenes well known to most Carlislers. A brief description on the back of each card will identify it.





CARLISLE IN TWELVE SKETCHES

This series of sketches/post cards was a local Carlisle offering by Thompson's Book Store and featured a view of First Lutheran itself, as well as our bell tower as seen from the old market (now the site of the new Cumberland County Courthouse). The artist, Donald Beetem, began sketching while serving with the intelligence section of the 97th Bombing Squadron in World War II in order to "relieve the tedium of army life."

After contacting our missionaries, Steve and Jodi Swanson, via e-mail, Taylor Miller, Social Ministry chairperson, recently received an e-mail response from them. Below are excerpts from that e-mail. (A printed copy of the full e-mail and pictures can be found on our missionary bulletin board located inside the entrance doors located off the south end of the parking lot.)

Dear Taylor,

Thank you so much for the kind email. Steve and I have been working on a new format for our regular communication. We are trying to switch to mail chimp to make it more


efficient which will help us to increase the frequency of our communication! In this regard, however, Steve works almost day and night and so the plan has been for myself to make this switch. Here now lies the problem- I'm not exactly techno savvy and have been trying to figure out this program so please bear with me!

There has been so much going on both at work and in the family. Steve burns the midnight oil as he is training about 4-8 Tanzanian [doctors] who are working in 2 hospitals, nurses in the NICU, seeing patients on the ward and the outpatient clinic. I have been working at the local Lutheran hospital primarily with malnourished children and have been visiting some of the villages for the purpose of education and follow up of some of our children. I am finding that the home situations for many of these children is harsh. Food insecurity, lack of consistent income for the family, means that many of our malnourished children are malnourished simply due to poverty. In this situation it has been difficult to find sustainable solutions since the source of the problem is poor education and lack of economic opportunities!

Monday I went to find this little girl whom we had cared for some months ago. I don't have a picture of her first arrival, but she was miserably sick with kwashiorkor (lack of protein). Here she is enjoying some books in the hospital, looking miraculously recovered! ...

 \dots I found 8 children, unsupervised except for the 70+ father in his own house. There are 3 homes in this "boma" with the father having one, and the

other two are meant for the 2 wives. One wife has died, the other mama was not home, but working for \$1.00/day to feed the father, herself, and about 10 children. We are planning to return in a week, to plant some green leafy trees that should produce for years, to bring some short term relief food, to inquire about enrolling them





In reality, we see and help individual children in the hospital to get "back on their feet", but sending them back into impoverished situations? It's tough. Community Development is a big project which takes a team. At this time, with Steve's full time work, and my part time work in the ward, I don't have the time to tackle these issues and I'm looking for projects that are already out there so that I might refer the families that I find in need. But honestly,

the need is greater than the resources. The needs are frankly overwhelming. We are trying to care lovingly for each child as they are before us, but keep in mind the bigger picture of the communities and the country. In summary, it's challenging!! ...

... I hope that gives you a glimpse of life here and helps to direct your prayers. Once we get the new system up and running on mail chimp, you will hear from us more regularly. Please accept my apology for the lack of correspondence. It is not for lack of gratitude- we are so grateful for your support which enables us to be here caring for these vulnerable ones.
