Building Project and Capital Campaign Update

The Building for Mission Steering Committee, our architects, Marotta/Main, and our general contractor, Galbraith/Pre-Design, have completed the value engineering process. A revised set of construction drawings, based on changes approved by the steering committee to materials and finishes and a slightly smaller "footprint" for the addition, has been sent out for re-bid. The steering committee will review the updated bids at its meeting on August 16 and will forward a recommendation to Congregation Council for action at its August 21 meeting.



The Finance Committee evaluated financing options from two lenders. The committee will meet again on August 20 to make a final financing recommendation to Congregation Council for action at its August 21 meeting.

On this timeline, we anticipate that Congregation Council will call a special congregation meeting for Sunday, September 9 or 16, to vote on moving forward with construction. Information about the final project costs and the proposed financing plan will be included in the written notice of the meeting sent to all members of the congregation in late August or early September.

Total pledged and unpledged campaign contributions paid: \$198,124

FINE ARTS AT FIRST 2018-2019 SERIES

DAVID WRIGHT AND "THE WRIGHT TOUCH" Sunday, October 14, 2018 at 3 P.M.



Vocalist, saxophonist, producer, and bandleader David Wright with six musicians of "The Wright Touch" bring their polished swing and jazz style to Carlisle. Wright retired as a member of the "President's Own," the United States Marine Band, in 1994. From the White House to the Library of Congress to all the Smithsonian Institution's museums and galleries, "The Wright Touch" has entertained for special events at every major Washington, D. C. venue since the 1980's. David Wright's professional artistry and experience always create a connection with his audience. The ensemble will present a concert from The Great American Songbook drawn from its White House dance band arrangements. Each song is introduced with an interesting story and performed with energy and stylistic excellence.

APPALACHIAN WIND QUINTET Sunday, November 4, 2018 at 4 P.M.

The award-winning Appalachian Wind Quintet, based in the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains in Hagerstown, Maryland, is dedicated to presenting woodwind quintet literature from its earliest beginnings in the classical period to the present time. Formed in 1987, the group is known for its superb musicianship, innovative programming, and highest professional caliber. Each musician has a rich knowledge of musical styles and vast experience with orchestral and chamber music repertoire. Brief oral program notes throughout the concert give an enlightening historical context to each composition. Members of the Appalachian Wind Quintet are flutist Barbara Spicher, oboist Ed Stanley, clarinetist Rick Mogensen, bassoonist Scott Cassada, and French horn player Ed Schupp.



CHRISTYAN SEAY Sunday, March 31, 2019 at 3 P.M.

Active in recital, oratorio and opera, Christyan Seay has sung extensively throughout Central PA and in venues abroad in Germany, Poland, and the Czech Republic. In April 2018 he participated in "The Underground Railroad: A Spiritual Journey", a concert featuring acclaimed soprano Kathleen Battle. Regionally, he has performed with the Harrisburg and Lancaster Symphonies and has sung in productions with the Harrisburg Opera Association, Philadelphia's Concert Operetta and Opera North, and Opera Lancaster. He serves as Artistic Director of the Capital Area Music Association, a Harrisburg community organization whose emphasis is the music of African-American composers and culture. The concert will be held as a benefit for **St. Barnabas Children's Ministry**, a summer camp to nurture the spiritual, educational, social, and physical development of Harrisburg's inner city youth. It was founded in 1993 by the Central PA Episcopal Diocese and the Lower Susquehanna Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.



DICKINSON COLLEGE ORCHESTRA AND CHOIR Sunday, April 28, 2019 at 4 P.M.

The Dickinson Orchestra, conducted by Gregory Woodbridge, and the College Choir, directed by Amy Wlodarski, will present their 2019 Spring Concert featuring Gabriel Fauré's Requiem. The composition is the French composer's beloved and best-known sacred work that focuses on the comfort and peacefulness of eternal rest. The orchestra is comprised of 40 to 60 students, community members, and faculty, and the choir is an ensemble of 60 to 80 singers. They will be joined by soprano Elizabeth Shoenfelt and baritone Jonathan Hays. Highlighted among other selections in the concert will be a performance by the winner of the Dickinson College Department of Music student-concerto competition.

From our Cantor:

[Editor's Note: Members have expressed interest in hearing more about the title "cantor," which congregation council adopted as the new position title for our musician. We asked David to explain the rich history of this title.]

The cantor is the leader of the congregation's song.



The term cantor is the historic designation for the vocation of the Lutheran Church musician. The cantor normally serves as organist, director of choirs and instrumental groups, and teaches, encourages, and nurtures the musical talent of the congregation. The cantor's calling, however, extends beyond the preparation of music for the various services. The cantor takes an interest in the personal and spiritual lives of those with whom he or she works, and is often musically active in the larger community in which the congregation is situated. (Association of Lutheran Church Musicians, 2003)

Throughout the years and across denominations those in musical leadership have been associated with titles such as organist, choir director, minister of music, director of music, precentor and cantor. Each of those words bears differing and various associations for those for whom the title is used, to those within the Church, and to people outside the church. Some titles may appear to be more of a job description such as 'organist'; some may imply formal recognition by the denomination such as 'minister'. Only 'cantor' more properly encompasses the broader calling that is the leadership of the congregation's song.

The Jewish tradition and the Catholic tradition also embrace the use of the term cantor. In those traditions the role is sometimes associated with an individual whose job description might be 'song leader', or someone who stands before the congregation confidently leading songs. That is not how the Lutheran tradition has envisioned this person, nor do we confine our understanding of that role to song leading, but we see the role in the broader context of the community.

The most famous example might be Johann Sebastian Bach who was the Kantor (German spelling) at the two primary churches in Leipzig, Germany. His role included teaching music and singing at the town school throughout the week in preparation for worship leadership.

The highest and best use of the God given skills is in the teaching, the encouragement and the nurture of the music of the liturgy and hymnody.


Welcome back, David!


